

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The spectacular fleet of the St Barths Bucket



Skirked at the St Barths Bucket! The trade winds shut off completely and served up three glossy calm afternoons in a row. That premise would bring long odds in Las Vegas ... but it was exactly how the Regatta unfolded. With a stalled front north of the Islands, the Wind Gods virtually took the weekend off – for all we could tell, they may have gone to Vegas! The good news was that the non-existent sailing conditions could not begin to dampen spirits among the record 30 mega-yacht fleet and 700+ crew in attendance.

In a dying eight-knot breeze, the Race Community (RC) got half the fleet started on Friday's 'Round the Island Race', before calling out the beach towels a scant hour later when the fleet all but lost steerage way in near zero wind. Paraiso got the picture early, notified the RC and headed first for the beach, with the rest of the fleet soon to follow. Shell Beach and Baie Columbier were fully assaulted for the afternoon by megayachts and megayacht games.

Friday night's open house/yacht hop was the usual moveable feast, with many yachts competing for unofficial 'best party' honours. Perini's Perseus, Bucket newbies, proved that this friendly, kid-oriented family and crew already

understand Bucket hospitality. Nearby, Victoria of Strathearn exhibited her usual epicurean flair, with her cheery crew led by Bucket veteran Capt Simon Farmer. Destination Fox H'br wowed the crowd with a lavish array lobster and seafood flown in from Nova Scotia - yum! It's always a thrill to be invited on board Ranger, and apparently everyone felt that vibe. At the far end of the docks, Chef Raffie Hurtado on Antara was determined to help his delightful new owners enhance their already-deserved reputation as charming hosts. He served up a series of delicious hors d'oeuvres, keeping them one of the busiest boats. Whisper's Amy Laing is a partythrowing pro, and it's a crew team act all the way, so their bash, featuring psychedelic blinking bling for the guests and disco music on deck kept revellers dancing on board late into the night. The only caveat for a wonderfully fun evening is that you can never make it to every boatt


The fleet started Saturday's 18-mile 'Wiggley Course' around the north and east of St Barths in a relative gale of almost nine knots of wind. The prospect of finishing a race looked good until intermittent squalls shut off the breeze like isolated iron curtains – wherein all available wind

was simply going straight up into the convection clouds. While the fleet was slow motion westling with several squalls, the RC shortened the course to what looked like an easy finish with a very short last leg. Unfortunately, the mother-in-law of all squalls simply erased the breeze across the entire

This gross miscarriage of nature snatched defeat from the very jaws of victory for the 46-metre Perini Navi Antana Her crew had sailed a flawless light air race by hitting the start and every shift masterfully. At the whim of the wind gods, she was forced to anchor just 200 yards from the finish for over an hour! No finish. No race. No

Several other yachts also sailed masterful light air races on Saturday. Zingaro and Whisper started on their numbers and walked right through the fleet. Along with Avalon, they were beginning to drift up on Antara when the clock ran out. Rebecca kicked up her heels in the light conditions as well, but also fell victim to the mother of all squalls.

Saturday night at the Bucket is not for sissies, offering two world-class parties. The owner's party, sponsored by Ralph Lauren, and hosted by Newport's David Ray in his spectacular new home at harbour's edge, was an elegant soirée worthy

of the guests attending. Holland Jachtbouw and The Yacht Report hosted the rockin' crew party, held on the newly refurbished dock. Hundreds of crew members, locals - and later on, the owner's party crowd enjoyed the bar, the endless barbeque and reggae dance band. A good time was definitely had by all.





Sunday dawned hopeful, with almost a dozen knots blowing in Gustavia – but it was a teaser that dropped off to a zephyr by the first start time. During an hour postponement, the RC yacht was assigned designed a short, reaching course for the six-knot prevailing breeze. Caribbean afternoon.

The 'no race' conundrum presented a headscratcher for the Race Committee. How do we present awards for non-races? This Zen kohn promulgated a spirited afternoon discourse. Do we keep the awards? Auction them? Award them for charitable benefit? It quickly became apparent that the only measurable performance in this non-regatta could be found in the starts. Each yacht was assigned a specific starting time in each pursuit race and we had accurate data on the difference between the assigned and actual start times. The results were really shocking! The most impressive starting time details for the entirefleet were the combined times of the 46metre Perini Navi ketch Antara. In a fleet that included two J-boats and a number of carbon fibre, scalding-fast mega performers, Antara's new crew sailed their 300T yacht to start merely four seconds late on Saturday and 14 seconds late on Sunday, clearly closer than all others! The second closest starters were also a great surprise. Within a fleet of mega yachts equipped with entirely automatic functions, the 1931 Classic William Fife (118-ft Schooner) Altair, sailed across the starting line within 14 seconds for Saturday and 18 seconds Sunday of her assigned starting time, with no electric winches. In fact, few winches at all; seven sails flying and a good head of speed! Another astounding performance!

The 148-ft Custom Baltic/Reichel Pugh, carbon fibre sloop Visione was third by the start measure, weighing in just behind Altair. By far the fastest yacht in the fleet and among the very best sailed as well, Visione typically starts up to two hours after the first yachts in a short, 22-mile race, then romps through the fleet to finish with the leaders.

The closing ceremony attracts another huge crowd for the awards, given for everything from Seamanship to Outstanding Crew and the always-coveted Escargot Cup, all symbolising the depth of relationships and history built up over 11 wonderful St Barths Buckets.

The results are detailed on the previous page, but sentimental favourites were 'Grandma Betty', the Matriarch of Perseus, chosen to win the Wolter Huisman Memorial Spirit of the Bucket award, for her devotion to her family - who epitomised the sheer fun of the event. While in place of an official Bucket winner, this year, the Bucket will be inscribed with 'Tommy Taylor' in memory of the much-beloved Nantucket Bucket founder, who died tragically in a recent accident.

No other award winners could match the sheer excitement of the owners, friends and crew of Antara, sailing their inaugural Bucket to a triple win. They started by winning the Perini Cup, and when they were awarded the Churchill Yacht Partners Seamanship award for some very clever moves, the crew and Capt. Robert "Johnno" Johnston were edstatic.

However, when Antara's first place start win was announced, the place went ballistic. Their collective exuberance is what the Buckets are all about, for while there might not have been any race winners in this years St Barths Bucket, by the end of the weekend, as always, everyone is a winner.
